What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the day in the church year where we mark the beginning of the season of **Lent**. During this season, we are all invited to think about the things in our lives that may be causing us to be distant from God and distant from others.

On Ash Wednesday, blessed ashes are put on your forehead in the shape of a cross and the words, "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return" are said.

This can be a startling statement to hear! However, the purpose is not to scare us but to remind us that we have been created by God and that it is God who holds us wherever we go, in life and when we go to heaven.

Saying Sorry Together

Dean Penny: Lent is a time to think about things that distract us from loving God or other people. Everybody makes mistakes; sometimes we speak harshly, tell lies, or don't think about the feelings of others. Lent is a time to tell God you're sorry for the times you have made mistakes. We also say sorry to the people we hurt. It is a great feeling to know that, even after we tell God about our mistakes, He still loves us no matter what!

In the language of your choice, you can respond with "Lord, we are sorry". Please keep your family's mic muted.

Blessing of the Ashes

Dean Penny:

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen**.

Scripture Readings + Imposition of the Ashes



After each reading, take turns putting ashes on each other's foreheads and say the bolded words. While you wait for your turn, try tracing your finger in the labyrinth on page 6.

Reader 1:

Be careful! When you do good things, don't do them in front of people just to be seen by them. If you do that, then you will have no reward from your Father in heaven.

Reader 2:

When you give to the poor, don't be like the show-offs. They blow trumpets before they give so that people will see them. They do that in the churches and on the streets. They want other people to honor them. I tell you the truth. They already have their full reward. So when you give to the poor, give very secretly. Don't let anyone know what you are doing. Your giving should be done in secret. Your Father can see what is done in secret, and he will reward you

Scripture Readings + Imposition of the Ashes



Reader 3:

When you pray, don't be like the show-offs. They love to stand in the churches and on the street corners and pray loudly. They want people to see them pray. I tell you the truth. They already have their full reward. When you pray, you should go into your room and close the door. Then pray to your Father who cannot be seen. Your Father can see what is done in secret, and he will reward you.

Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Recuerda que eres polvo y al polvo volverás Reader 4:

"When you give things up, don't put on a sad face like the show-offs. They make their faces look strange to show people that they are giving things up. I tell you the truth, they already have their full reward. So when you give up things, comb your hair and wash your face. Then people will not know that you are doing something hard. But your Father, whom you cannot see, will see you. Your Father sees what is done in secret, and he will reward you.

Help us to remember that in all ways we belong to you, **Amen.**




What is Lent?

Lent is the church season leading up to Easter. It lasts for **40 days**, beginning on **Ash Wednesday** and ending the day before **Easter**.

The last week of Lent is called **Holy Week** because we remember Jesus's last week on Earth before he died.

You may see a lot of **purple** during Lent because purple represents preparation. We are preparing for Jesus's death and resurrection!




Each Church season has a different color. Color the seasons according to the key:

Family prayer ideas:

- Use the Prayer Catcher
- Bedtime reflections
- -Pray before meals
- -Make a prayer jar
