PRELUDE

Music selected by the worship leader.

WELCOME

The worship leader or a clergy person welcomes all to the gathering.

OPENING

We begin with a few moments of silence, to center ourselves and enter into God's presence.

Leader: Blessed be our loving, liberating, lifegiving God. All: And blessed be God's people gathered here.

Leader: Let us pray together.

All: as we light the lamps of evening, kindle, O God, in our hearts, the flame of that love which never ceases, that it may burn in us and give light to others. May we shine for ever in your presence,

set on fire with that eternal light of yours which puts to flight the darkness of this world. As you once freed your people from bondage, so we call on you to lead us to renewed freedom, for the sake of your love. Amen.

THE LESSONS

What is Juneteenth?

Juneteenth honors the date, June 19, 1865, when the last Confederate community of enslaved Americans in Galveston, Texas, received word that they had been freed from bondage. Nearly three years earlier, President Lincoln had issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which reads in part:

"On the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, all persons held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States, shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free; and the Executive Government of the United States, including the military and naval authority thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of such persons, and will do no act or acts to repress such persons, or any of them, in any efforts they may make for their actual freedom...

"I do order and declare that all persons held as slaves within said designated States, and parts of States, are, and henceforward shall be free; and that the Executive government of the United States, including the military and naval authorities thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of said persons.

"And I hereby enjoin upon the people so declared to be free to abstain from all violence, unless in necessary self-defence; and I recommend to them that, in all cases when allowed, they labor faithfully for reasonable wages.

"And I further declare and make known, that such persons of suitable condition, will be received into the armed service of the United States to garrison forts, positions, stations, and other places, and to man vessels of all sorts in said service.

"And upon this act, sincerely believed to be an act of justice, warranted by the Constitution, upon military necessity, I invoke the considerate judgment of mankind, and the gracious favor of Almighty God."

Selections from the writings of Martin Luther King, Jr.

"We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly. Never again can we afford to live with the narrow provincial 'outside agitator' idea ... It is unfortunate that the demonstrations [were] taking place in Birmingham, but it is even more unfortunate that the city's white power structure left the Negro community with no alternative." *Letter from Birmingham Jail*

"One of the most ringing replies came from a child of no more than eight years who walked with her mother one day in a demonstration. An amused policeman leaned down to her and said with mock gruffness, 'What do you want?' The child looked into his eyes, unafraid, and gave her answer. 'FEEDOM,' she said. She could not even pronounce the word, but no Gabriel trumpet could have sounded a truer note." Why We Can't Wait

"The Church has an opportunity and duty to lift up its voice like a trumpet and declare unto the people the immorality of segregation. It must affirm that every human life is a reflection of divinity, and that every act of injustice mars and defaces the image of God in man." Where do We Go from Here

Leader That we be courageous in living out the Gospel, we pray . . .

People: May we accept the call to be bearers of peace.
